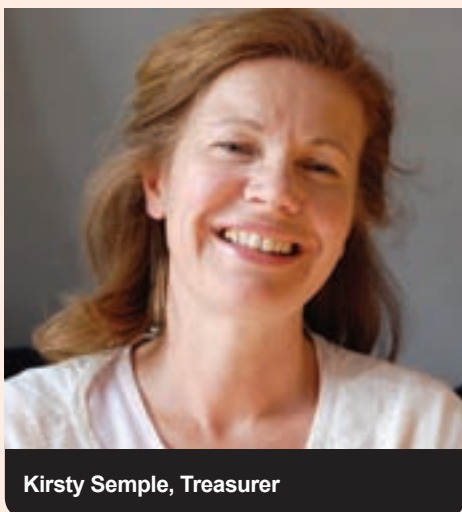

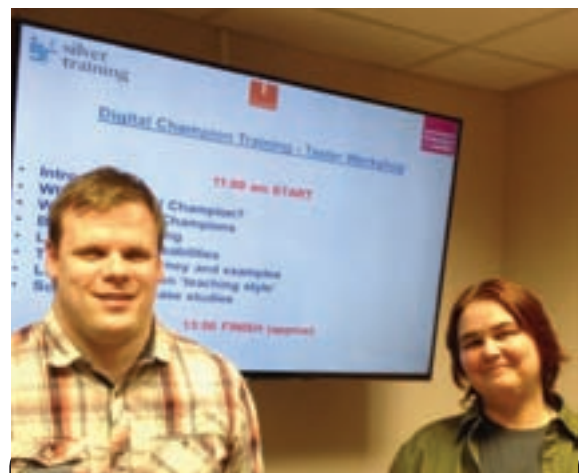

Gertrude is 101. She moved to England from South Africa in 1961 with her three children and qualified as a teacher. She registered a private school in her house which she continues to run to this day. "I love people and that makes me a good teacher" she says.

"I enrolled on the UCanDoIT course because I wanted to have a proper computer course, with a tutor to teach me and be patient, since I am not the best student around.

"At my age I tend to forget, and do things the wrong way. When I didn't know, I could ring my tutor Boyko who was so patient and understanding. I am feeling a lot more confident now, I proof-read for my son and that keeps my brains working, keeps me healthy and in good shape."

Pamela has been a tutor with UCanDoIT for over two years. She enjoys her work and says she finds each day and each learner different.

"The key is to go at the learner's own pace" she says. "Help them feel comfortable, no matter what level they're at. It's a really rewarding job and I have fantastic learners.

"One of my learners, a lady in her 80's was taught to use her computer to design and print cards. At our final lesson, she handed me a 'Thank you' card she had made. It warmed my heart and made my day."

Desmond Patterson (pictured with Pamela) had a stroke and has the use of only one hand. He was keen to learn with UCanDoIT and now enjoys Skype to keep in contact with friends and family in Jamaica.

Duncan covers Bolton and the surrounding areas and joined the charity in 2015. He previously worked as a technology lecturer and taught assistive technology to students with learning disabilities.

Duncan said “My first two UCanDoIT learners were both elderly and lovely to work with. One has MS, is a wheelchair user and only has the use of one hand. She benefitted greatly by learning how to attach family photos to emails to send them to her daughter in Australia. The second learner is blind and she was struggling a little with Dolphin Guide software, but after being shown how to do things and changing some of the settings she is now confident in using it for all of her needs.

“I find this work very rewarding and enjoy meeting people who are open about how technology can enrich their lives and make difficult tasks much easier. Many people don't realise how much technology can benefit them, until we show them what can be achieved.”

Trustee Catherine accompanies Tutor to lessons

UCanDoIT trustee Catherine accompanied tutor Daniel to further understand the work we do. One of the learners visited was Grace, 70, who is paraplegic and was eager to learn how to use computers for communication and learning.

Catherine said “The highlight of my year was the day I spent shadowing Daniel, as he delivered lessons in London to learners with very different training needs. The work is far more complex than I imagined, and it was incredibly useful to see how tutors build an environment of trust and support.”

Grace is now using spreadsheets to record and monitor payments to carers. This has helped her to take control of her finances and identify and rationalise unnecessary payments.

Catherine concludes “As a trustee, I feel immensely proud of the tutors' work and privileged to be able to offer my support to UCanDoIT.”

Raymond – finding new enthusiasm for life

Raymond, 55 lives in Glasgow. He is blind and was taught to use Guide software to access his emails and the internet. He said “Although I had some keyboard skills, my tutor Tommy took time to show me a new world using the internet. Before my tuition I basically did very little with my time. Now I have a new lease of life, I like to write short stories and am thinking of starting a novel.

Shwan new skills for a new future

When Shwan first encountered UCanDoIT, he had little optimism for his future. He had many barriers to overcome. As a displaced person he had little English, no computer skills and is visually impaired. He was provided with tutoring and screen-reading software that helped build his vocabulary whilst supporting his visual impairment and building the computer skills he needed.

Shwan took the skills he gained from UCanDoIT, developed them further and achieved his European Computer Driving License (ECDL) which helped him secure a place at Middlesex University. He is now working to achieve his main objective, an MSc in Computer Science.

Ruth, building a business

Businesswoman Ruth is National Register of Access accredited and has campaigned on all aspects of access and inclusion for over 20 years. Hearing impaired and a single mother of a son, she is setting up a social enterprise to advise organisations on removing barriers to inclusion in their service provision.

She said “I had ten sessions with UCanDoIT and they opened up a whole new world to me. At the time, I was also doing a part-time PGCE, which demanded good computer skills, so my new found knowledge was useful there too.

“Now I’ve graduated and UCanDoIT has trained me, my focus is the new business, starting with the education sector which now has to produce access statements as part of a new ruling.

“And, together with my son, I am now coding our new, accessible website.”



Victor – staying active through IT

Victor is an 83 year old veteran who is registered blind. He was widowed in 2011 and lives by himself. Despite his disabilities and the loss of his beloved wife, he decided to make the most of his years by embarking on a number of activities that would make more able-bodied people envious.



Among the activities he has undertaken in the last year are: tandem cycle riding, archery, photography, fishing, becoming a history tour guide for his favourite football team, computing and starring in a local short film. Victor uses his computer on a daily basis to keep in touch with friends and family, book holidays, shop online and keep in contact with various organisations that he is associated with.

Viv – acting the part

Viv has thyroid eye disease which means that she has variable amounts of sight and requires regular surgery to deal with the condition. She said “My tutor was incredibly understanding of the whole process. I work in the theatre so I had to strive to gain the confidence to work again. The support from UCanDoIT was instrumental in helping me return to work.

“At 79 I am still working and was last on the small screen for the BBC 4 programme Going Forward with Jo Brand. I am in episode one as one of the people cared for by character Buccaneer. I work frequently as an ‘ancient person’. My message is that without UCanDoIT I would never have got back to work as all jobs are now dealt with through email and electronic communication. I needed the skill and I am fortunate to have been offered the training. If you have the chance, go for it!”

Athen, new job from new skills

Athen left school with some knowledge of computers but was unsure how to upload a CV, email effectively or use attachments.

“After my computer training with UCanDoIT I felt more confident applying for jobs on line” said Athen.

“It took time to find an employer who looked beyond my disability of cerebral palsy and gave me a chance of employment. I now work for MacDonald’s as a ‘crew member’. Recently I was voted employee of the month.

“As a person with disabilities I feel I have to work harder to find my place in a working environment. Thanks to training and support from UCanDoIT, finding work became possible.”

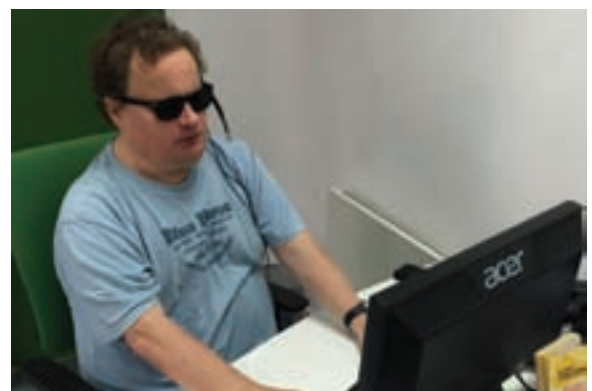
Mike, volunteering and building work skills

UCanDoIT volunteer and professional computer programmer, Mike Ray started losing his sight at a young age and became totally blind at the age of 44.

Mike wishes to further build his skills to return to the workplace. His work with UCanDoIT, started with a report detailing how UCanDoIT might develop an online presence and a ‘virtual community’ for our beneficiaries. Mike states “UCanDoIT online should tell the compelling stories of how the lives

of our learners are richly enhanced by the IT lessons delivered to them in their own homes.”

Volunteer Mike will use his specialist skills on initial development work of our virtual community. This will provide peer to peer support and communication between our learners. Mike says “It’s good to be able to help UCanDoIT develop its virtual community. It’s a perfect fit for my skills and life-experience.”

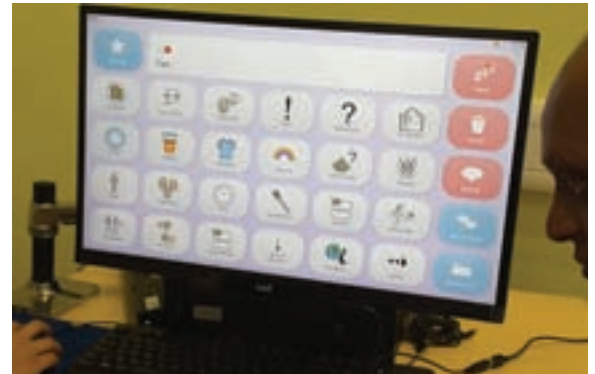

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Skills development for severe complex needs

As part of our tutor skills development programme, we have been working collaboratively with the Royal Hospital for Neuro-disability (RNH) in the use of the revolutionary application, 'Eye Gaze'. The programme provides access to digital technology for people with severe physical, neurological and communication issues.

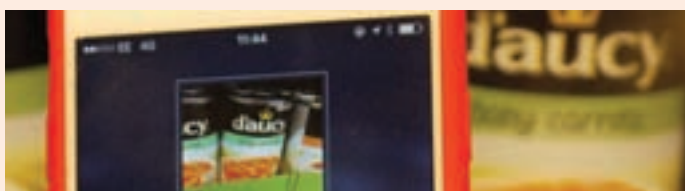
With RNH help we have been able to further expand the skill set of UCanDoIT's specialist tutors to provide dedicated services to more people with severe complex needs.



Alexander – 'visiting' countries all over the world

Alex, 70, lives in Coatbridge, Scotland and is quadriplegic. He has a power chair he operates with his chin and has spent many years trying to find ways to keep occupied when he can't get out and about in his chair.

Alex now uses Grid3 with the index finger on his left hand which has enabled him to use a push button to access his Kindle to read books, send and receive emails and use Facebook and the web. He said "I am enjoying visiting countries all over the world and reading the information supplied by Wikipedia, Google and YouTube, also looking at videos. The lessons with my tutor Joyce have been very successful in improving my lifestyle and I thank UCanDoIT very much."



Hazel, testing mobile apps

UCanDoIT has become well-known for skills in reviewing technology that can best serve people with a variety of disabilities. This is essential for our award-winning teaching and vital for our learners.

The Stanley Grundy Foundation funded UCanDoIT to set up the APPLICABLE Mobiles project to review suitable downloads for people with disabilities. This includes people who are hearing impaired, the elderly, blind and visually impaired learners and those with physical disabilities.

Here, one of our tutors Hazel, who is blind, is 'road testing' a mobile phone App. It enables her to check the contents and description of items in the supermarket, allowing her to shop without sighted assistance and to compare prices.

Brian, learning and helping others in Wales

Brian, 75, from Llanelli in South Wales was self-employed for 49 years. At 70 he became blind in one eye. This, together with sight problems with the other eye, left him severely sight impaired.

He said “I was computer illiterate despite running a business but I wanted to learn. My tutor Trina was very patient with me to achieve the results she did.

“I have now set up a visually impaired and blind bowls club. Some of the players, who hadn’t played before, are starting to compete in tournaments. I am secretary to two clubs and organisations and deputy secretary to another. I have a full and eventful life being useful to others and I am now enjoying the interest and excitement of the internet as well – all a direct result of UCanDoIT training.”



Shelia in Scotland – a degree and new confidence

Sheila, 60, from Lanarkshire says “I am so grateful I was able to access training UCanDoIT training.” Sheila has osteoporosis, is visually and hearing impaired and began training with no IT experience.

“I was nervous and had a short concentration span due to medication. My tutor was so friendly and patient and supported learning at my pace. She spoke to me in a way that allowed me to develop my understanding gradually and was available by email if I got muddled.

“The foundations I received from my UCanDoIT course helped me complete my BSc Environmental Studies Degree with Honours. I am a wheelchair user but can use my iPad, iPhone and iWatch to keep in contact with family and friends and can also use assistive IT technology. The tutor gave me confidence and now I’m not scared to try new things.”

The Anthony Wigram Achievement Award

The Anthony Wigram Achievement Award is about those learners who have created a social impact either personally, or within their community, through the use of IT and the support of UCanDoIT.

Our founder said "This is the second year of the award and I was given the unenviable task of choosing a winner from numerous nominees. All had their own story to tell and I was impressed by a great many."

And this year's winner is...

"This year I have decided to give the award to Mike Brace CBE, who despite his disability has achieved great things" said Anthony.

Mike Brace is a former paralympic skier, social worker and leader of disabled charities. He was Chief Executive of Vision 2020 UK (2001-2012) and served as Chairman of the British Paralympic Association (2001-2008). He was blinded at age ten by an accident, gained a Diploma in Social Work in 1976 and in the same year competed as a cross-country skier in the inaugural Winter Paralympics. He was awarded the OBE in 2005 and CBE in 2009 for services to Paralympic sport.

Learner determined not to let an acquired disability stand in his way

"The training UCanDoIT gave me was a great support. In my 50's I found myself at home alone and trying to run a charity. Previously, I had a reader who would read for me. Then suddenly and rapidly I had to get online and access a computer to continue my work. I found myself with a huge gap in my capacity but UCanDoIT came to my rescue. They were able to fulfil my urgent needs by giving me tailored tuition.

"On a personal level, I also found that more and more options were opening up for visually impaired people; personal shopping, event and theatre dates, being able to check refuse collection dates and many things that people take for granted. I also wanted access to these things and UCanDoIT stepped in to help me again. In a way, you could say UCanDoIT has provided me with the skills to work and the opportunity for play."
